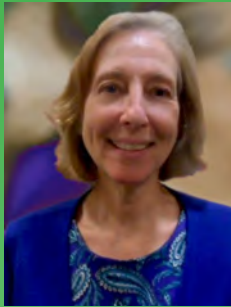

Executive Director Search

As you have seen elsewhere in the Wire, ALIVE! is in a time of transition. Ken Naser, after 10 years as Executive Director of ALIVE!, is retiring, and we are in the process of finding a new Executive Director. We are not looking for a replacement for Ken, because Ken would be impossible to replace. Before Ken became ALIVE!'s first Executive Director in 2004, he served for nearly 30 years as a volunteer, performing almost every volunteer position possible including President of the organization. We will always be indebted to Ken, and we are delighted that he is not going away, just going back to being a part-time volunteer rather than a more-than-full-time Executive Director.

The search for a new Executive Director began with a vacancy announcement which was widely disseminated in June. To generate a large pool of applicants, ads were placed in a number of publications as well as on internet job posting sites. The announcement also was distributed to all of our member congregations and the Alexandria Council of Human Service Organizations (ACHSO) members. We were fortunate to receive a very good response.

Applications were first reviewed by three former ALIVE! Presidents who selected a group of well-qualified applicants. These applications were then reviewed by the Search Committee which included a former ALIVE! President, a former Board member and active volunteer who is also a personnel professional, and a former City employee who has worked extensively with ALIVE! over many years. Final candidates will be interviewed by the current ALIVE! President and Vice President, who will select a candidate to be presented to the Board of ALIVE! for approval.

It is hoped that this process will be completed in October and a new Executive Director will be in place before the holidays. While Ken's experience, guidance, and diligence will certainly be missed, we are excited about this next phase of ALIVE!'s growth and opportunity to pursue our mission.

The CDC Welcomes New Staff Members

ALIVE! and the Child Development Center (CDC) were pleased to welcome three new staff members this summer. One of them is a totally new face, while the other two have previous experience with ALIVE!.

The first to arrive was Enna Blanco who reported to work on July 9 to serve as a classroom support staff member. She has more than four years of experience working with young children, including serving as an Assistant Teacher in a preschool classroom. Enna is fluent in both English and Spanish and has begun the pursuit of an Associate's Degree in Child Development at Northern Virginia Community College.

Next to arrive, on August 8, was Raena McKinney, the new Lead Teacher in the Red Classroom. Raena holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Arts Management and is currently taking courses to achieve licensure in Early Childhood Education. She also has more than six years of experience working with young children and has served as a Lead Teacher at another Alexandria preschool.



Raena is a familiar face to CDC staff, students, and parents. Her son Asa was a proud graduate of the CDC in June and will enter kindergarten this fall.

Last to arrive, on August 11, was Jennifer Newman, the CDC's new Family Support Worker. Jennifer is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker with more than 12 years of experience working with young children and their families. Jennifer is very familiar with ALIVE! and the CDC, having served as Family Support Worker from April 2004 until June 2007.

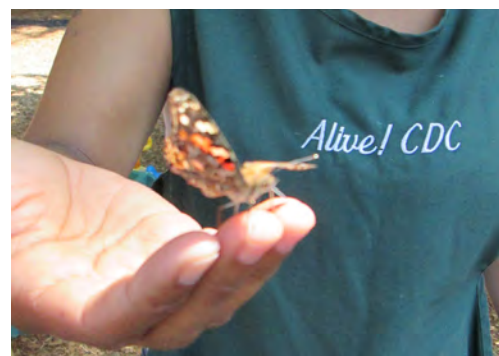


Butterflies Galore!!!

This summer, the CDC staff wanted to present new camp themes for the children's learning and enjoyment. One of the themes chosen was "Insects and Bugs." Each classroom had a different type of insect to study. The Green Room had ladybugs, the Red Room had ants, and the Blue Room had butterflies. Of the three, everyone agreed that studying the butterflies' development was the most fun and rewarding.

We first received a set of little caterpillars with special food to eat. Each day, the children observed them and saw how they got bigger and bigger. Then, they watched with wonder and anticipation as the caterpillars entered the chrysalis stage. Finally, one day near the end of July, the butterflies began to emerge, one by one. They were "Painted Lady" butterflies with beautiful markings. After all of them had come out of their chrysalises, it was time to release them. We took the "butterfly nursery" to the playground and opened it up. Some of the butterflies seemed reluctant to leave and were helped along by the staff. Away they all flew to their adult butterfly lives!

Thinking (and Doing) Outside the Box

The “box” is ALIVE!’s Family Emergency Program (FEP). I’m only in my twelfth year volunteering with ALIVE! (always with FEP), but I presume that for most of the 45 years that ALIVE! has existed, FEP’s resources have been structured to assist Alexandrians in need in paying their rent, utilities, and medical bills. The needs of Alexandrians, however, don’t always fit in a tidy “box”. Sometimes those needs call for us to focus a measure of our efforts elsewhere. There have been a few of those needs in the last couple of years.

Our first “outside the box” program was the Security Deposit Loan Program which began in 2012. Intended to promote self-sufficiency, I’m happy to report that 41 percent of the funds that were loaned out during the first year were paid back. Quite impressive, I think, considering how very little these low-income individuals and families have available to live on from month to month. Among others, we have assisted with partial security deposits that enabled two families that had resided in our ALIVE! House shelter to move into homes of their own. Most recently, we helped a homeless mom and her two children with a security deposit loan that took them from the streets to an apartment where they no longer had to worry about where they would sleep from one night to the next.

In late 2013, a conversation I had with David Wynne, an Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) Social Worker, led to “Students Seeing Clearly,” another “outside the box” program. A great number of generous donations received before the end of 2013 enabled us to help quite a number of low-income students with both eye exams and glasses during the second half of this past school year. We hope to help even more students during the new school year.

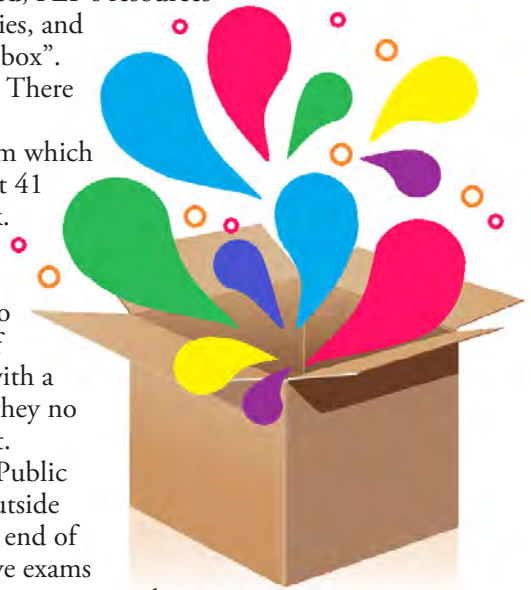
The relationship between ACPS and FEP is ever growing. In the spring, a student, newly arrived from the Congo, was enrolling in the T.C. Williams International Academy*. When asked if there was anything he needed, he asked for a bar of soap. I soon learned that the vast majority, upwards of 95%, of the approximately 500 students from foreign countries attending the TCW International Academy are living below the poverty line. When the word spread that many of these students were in need of toiletries/personal hygiene items, ALIVE! volunteers, as well as a couple of the ALIVE! congregations, donated enough supplies for all the students that needed those items to receive “fully loaded” gift bags. And we’re gearing up for the new school year with supplies stockpiled over the summer.

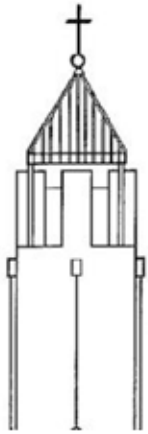
Three ALIVE! congregations - Trinity United Methodist Church, Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church, and the Church of the Resurrection - have recently donated funds to provide \$500 in rental assistance, over and above any other available ALIVE! financial assistance, for Afghan immigrant families brought to the United States by the U.S. Department of State on “Special Immigrant Visas.” These Afghan nationals were employed by, or worked on behalf of, our country in Afghanistan for at least one year and had received threats because of that employment. Close to 20 such families have been settled in our City since December 2013. Since their arrival, limited assistance has been provided by Catholic Charities and Lutheran Social Services, as well as Alexandria’s Department of Community and Human Services (DCHS). However, despite this assistance, most of these families struggle to reach self-sufficiency. ALIVE!’s Furniture, Housewares, Food, and Family Emergency programs have all done much to support these families as they arrived with nothing more than what they could physically carry. FEP is administering the aforementioned rental assistance funds.

Lastly, I’ll mention our latest “outside the box” project. FEP’s FY 2015 Annual Budget is \$260,000. No overhead costs come out of that fund. Every penny goes towards helping Alexandrians in need. The amount of our annual budget has been stable over the last few years, thanks to our generous donors. But, for FY 2015, we are starting out with an additional \$26,000 over and above the \$260,000, and we will have yet another \$26,000 for the second half of the fiscal year. These funds, segregated from FEP’s main budget, are being earmarked for rental assistance for Alexandrians who are homeless or considered to be on the verge of homelessness. We are working closely with the Homeless Services’ Community Services Coordinator (DCHS) and others to assist those in the direst of circumstances.

So, to our loyal supporters, THANK YOU! And please know that FEP’s \$260,000 annual budget will continue, as always, to provide financial assistance to low-income Alexandrians for rent, utilities, and medical expenses. All of our “outside the box” initiatives described above have been funded and supported separately by generous folks like all of you who, like all of us volunteering at ALIVE!, care deeply about our neighbors in need.
