These are people who are often exhausted by all the daily pressures to keep their families together and safe. These are the people we serve." I couldn't have said it any better.

I readily understand that ALIVE!'s clients must make these same kinds of decisions everyday of their lives...24/7. But what would I do if I were in that dilemma? Have you ever thought of how you would react? I think about it all the time, and I honestly don't know what I'd do. It's almost too painful to dwell on for very long.

Great needs create Emergency for the Family Emergency Program ALIVE!'s Family Emergency Program volunteers work five days a week helping the

needy of Alexandria to pay rent, utility bills, medical bills, prescription medicine and other necessities. They also pack and distribute food throughout the city. In FY 2001/2002 a record \$275,540 went to 2659 of Alexandria's neediest families. Additionally, a 3 day supply of food went to 2,307 household.

Over \$106,000 of this assistance was directed specifically to 9/11 economic victims and was made possible by one time grants from the United Way's September 11th Fund, the Presbyterian Church USA and the Episcopal Church.

Even with the extra funds by the end of FY02, the FEP was \$11,000 over budget projections. As a result and due to uncertainty of incoming contribution this fall, the Program is strictly limited to grants of \$10,000 per month. September's \$10,000 had been distributed by the 6th of the month.

Volunteers who answer the phone and process the requests have the unhappy task of delivering the sad news - that the funds are depleted until the next month.

Maximum allotments and extending the intervals between assistance will help with the budgeting but only increased funds will help with the need!

ALIVE! Provides Over 106,000 to Help Alexandria's 9/11 Economic Victims

Where were you on the morning of September 11th?

Mr. Zejed* was waiting in Alexandria's Court House for his disability hearing scheduled for 9:45 a.m. After two years of waiting to see if he could get disability income since diabetes left him nearly unable to walk, suddenly, guards were evacuating the building.

Despite his disability, Mr. Zejed had struggled to support his wife and teenage son, and pay rent on an efficiency apartment, by driving a taxicab at National Airport. After 9/11, Mr. Zejed lost his livelihood, modest savings, and good credit as he struggled to make ends meet—on five different medications, he was taking half his dose to make prescriptions last.

Divine intervention?

Like others who deliver food and furniture, I have had many memorable experiences. This one I shall never forget. A call came from a family emergency office volunteer: a wheel chair was requested by a person at the Carpenter's Shelter. I went to the furniture committee's warehouse and found that there was only one wheel chair there. It lacked the supporting attachments for legs and feet. I was not sure whether to deliver it, but finally decided to do so.

When I brought the wheel chair into the main hall at the shelter, a man came crawling along the floor, pulled himself up into the chair and wheeled happily away. An amputee with lower legs gone from the knee down, **he had no need of the missing parts of the wheel chair.** ----- God or serendipity? - Don Mela


Beth El Project Benefits ALIVE! Food Program

Housewares Volunteers Deliver More than Pots and Pans !!!

It's hard to know what you're going to find when delivering donated housewares to those in need.


One day, an ALIVE! a volunteer happened to bring pots and pans to the bleak kitchen of a young man just in time for him to cook Thanksgiving dinner for his parents. He had just moved out of a shelter.

Last summer, a mother and three little girls beamed as they helped carry into their empty apartment bags and boxes of bedding, dishes, a big frying pan, a few pots, and, tucked away among the towels, small stuffed animals. At ALIVE!'s Last Saturday Food Distribution, an elderly woman selected several items, including a small suitcase, but when a gentleman appeared interested in the suitcase, she gave it to him because "he probably really needed it."

Many times, ALIVE! has provided mattress pads, sheets, and blankets to cover beds donated to needy families by ALIVE!'s Furniture Program. And if beds weren't available, the Housewares Program provided comforters and other padding for families to sleep on.

And sometimes the needs we meet are less basic but we still deliver a smile—somehow, in the midst of arranging a delivery to a woman in one of Alexandria's high rises for the elderly, our volunteer learned that the woman really loved old-fashioned handmade doilies for dressers and backs of chairs. And the volunteer had some! So, along with the sheets and towels, the woman happily received a pile of well-aged crocheted doilies.

ALIVE!'s Housewares Program fills some very real basic needs, but it is the smiles on the faces of those who welcome our deliveries that let us know how much what we do means to these families.

LARUE BARNES IS NEW ALIVE! HOUSE DIRECTOR

Effective September 15, 2002, LaRue Barnes has become Director of ALIVE! House/Brighter Futures and Fiorella Dinch has assumed case management responsibilities for both programs. Because of the current management and programmatic responsibilities of this staff and because many Brighter Futures' clients are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless, we know this new venture offers efficiency and proven expertise to both programs.

This is the first time in its history that ALIVE! House is hiring a Shelter Director. Since 1972, the House has been managed by the volunteer Chair of the ALIVE! House Committee. The scope of the program has enlarged to provide more intensive case management for residents, who are staying for longer periods of time in order to be better prepared for their futures. The responsibilities and duties of the Chair enlarged proportionally and the position became full time – plus! When the City of Alexandria agreed this summer to provide funding for its clients who are residing at the House, the means became available to hire a director. Bonnie Meyer will continue to serve as the Resident Manager. Suzanne Arnold, our current Chair, has agreed to continue as Co-Chair with our new Co-Chair, Heather Stras, from the Beth El Hebrew Congregation.

CDC Classrooms Welcome Start of New School Year

In our classroom for four year olds, Lead Teacher Terry Brown and Assistant Teacher Nancy Walton welcomed 15 smiling faces, five of which are new to the CDC. This year they will focus on developing positive self-esteem, fostering independence, and preparing for kindergarten through building pre-reading, language, and pre-math skills. This month is dedicated to getting to know themselves and one another. Their themes are: Let's Get Acquainted—getting to know teachers, classmates, friends, and family; I Am Special, I Am Me; and My Body—ways to keep our bodies healthy.

In our classroom for three year olds, Lead Teacher Carrie Diggins and Assistant Teacher Valerie Beatty welcomed 11 shining stars, six of which are new to the CDC. Our teachers look forward to working with parents to help build their child's skills needed for future success. This month, they too will be focusing on developing a healthy body, a healthy self-image, and healthy friend-ships/relationships.

Leader Paula Smith and Assistant Teacher Carroneca Palmore welcomed 2 new, eager to learn, 2 ½ year olds. For these children, the CDC is their first childcare experience. Both teachers have been able to give these children the one-on-one attention they need to help them adjust to school, and all are eagerly anticipating the arrival of several more young children expected to start in the next few weeks.

The CDC hosted a Parent Breakfast in mid-September, and is looking forward to hosting an Open House on October 3rd and a field trip to the Cox Farm Pumpkin Patch in late October.

ALIVE!, United Way & CFC

ALIVE! will continue to be a United Way agency. In the past we have been effected only from the many donations received due to donor designations but also from grants to our various programs from the United Way Community Services Fund. Contributions through the United Way and the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) appeals have always played an important role in ALIVE!'s total income. With the still unanswered questions about this years's annual campaigns, ALIVE! is in the precarious position of not knowing what to budget or what the uncertain outcome of the United Way/CFC campaign might be. This worry coupled with the projected social services funding cuts from the Federal, State and local levels, is indeed troubling. If in past years, you have been a supporter of ALIVE! through the United Way or CFC payroll deduction plans and your employer has decided to continue its participation in the campaign, we hope we can count on you again.

Please note that the United Way of the National Capital Area has made, and continues to make, many strides in getting more stringent financial policies in place. This year as in the past, 4.5 percent of each CFC donation will be used for United Way administration and campaign costs. And, ten percent has been established as the United Way private sector and local government administration fee. These administrative costs are very low and enable many of our donors to give more through regular payroll deductions than they could give if they wrote a single check in the next few months. The payroll deductions ensure that ALIVE will have a regular cash flow of donations throughout the year.

If you find that a United Way workplace campaign or some similar payroll charity deduction is not open to you, please contact me and let me know (Alivetoo@aol.com). We are exploring alternative ways to receive your annual pledge through a scheduled, automated payment arrangement.

It does its work through you and people like you who support us through tireless hours of volunteering, and thoughtful financial help. ALIVE! exists because of you. Together, ALIVE! provides answers to some of these daunting questions—utility payments instead of food? rent instead of medical care?

Queen Street Clinic and ALIVE! Provide Hope for Alexandria's Uninsured

The Queen Street Clinic was opened August 20, 2001 by Anne Boston Parish, a Family Nurse Practitioner, who saw a need in the community to treat the medically underinsured and uninsured. ALIVE! has been an important partner with Queen Street Clinic this past year. Since the clinic opened, ALIVE! has provided almost \$32,000 in emergency financial assistance to patients unable to afford even the modest fees for office visits, prescriptions, lab fees and diagnostic tests.

From July 2001 through June 2002, ALIVE! provided over \$50,000 in emergency medical payments for needy Alexandrians referred by Queen Street Clinic, Inova Alexandria Hospital, the Department of Human Services, and other agencies to pay for prescription medicines, eyeglasses and eye exams, dental visits, physician fees, medical tests, hospital fees, and medical de-

vices such as glucometers. These payments were funded in part by a grant from the Community Services Fund of the United Way of the National Capital Area.

Alexandria alone has over 24,000 medically uninsured residents. Many uninsured residents go without health care because they cannot afford to pay or cannot find a health care provider willing to see them. Anne Parish's dream was to open the doors so that families could get medical care without having to resort to using emergency rooms.

From August 20, 2001 through June 30, 2002, Queen Street Clinic provided 2,900 patient visits. ALIVE!'s Family Emergency Program and Old Presbyterian Meeting House's Family-to-Family Program have funded visits, prescriptions, and tests for up to one-third of the patients seen each month. Queen Street Clinic also partners with Lab Corp. of America and WB& A Imaging to get discounted fees for laboratory and imaging services for patients, and with Catholic Charities and Timberman's Pharmacy to get medication for chronically ill individuals.

In July and August, Queen Street Clinic treated 900 more patients. Ms. Parish has been able to uncover and treat illnesses among her patients that would otherwise have gone undiagnosed, including cancer, diabetes, thyroid disease, and heart dis-ease. This July, the Queen Street Clinic Foundation was formed to enable closer cooperation with other local nonprofits, allow for direct donations, and serve more Alexandrians in need.

Sylvia and Donald* had planned to move out of public housing. Donald had a good job with Northwest Airlines at National Airport nearby—they were even managing to scrimp to send their young children to private school as they struggled (-to leave poverty behind. On September 22nd, Donald was laid off and bills started mounting.

With grants from the Presbyterian Church USA and the United Way's September 11th Fund, ALIVE! was able to keep these families from being evicted and having utilities cut-off, and get all Mr. Zejed's prescriptions

re-filled.



Between September 11th and June 6, 2002, ALIVE! made emergency payments totaling over \$106,000 for 9/11 economic victims to help almost 300 City of Alexandria residents. Most were cab and shuttle bus drivers—over 50%—while over a third worked in hotels, restaurants or tourism. Fifty-five percent of the payments went to rent and mortgages, while over 14% went to pay electric bills.

ALIVE! coordinated closely with other local agencies such as Tenants' and Workers' Support Committee, the Alexandria Department of Human Services, and FEMA funded Project Resilience outreach workers. Each case was thoroughly documented by ALIVE! volunteers and staff, who proved they were up to this new challenge.

Despite ALIVE!'s help, Mr. Zejed's family is still struggling—although they dream of sending their son to college, for now, that is out of the question. Sylvia went back to work, and with ALIVE!'s help on rent and utilities, Donald was able to get re-trained in computers, and get a job. But then their car was totaled, Sylvia lost her job as a result, and so instead of saving to move they are saving for a car.

But both are grateful that ALIVE! was there to help when they had nowhere else to turn.




