House who are trying to get back on their feet financially and emotionally. Their hope is that we can help them bring stability to them and their children.

# Notes from the Executive Director

During the long Labor Day weekend, many Americans were being awakened to the horror of the hurricane damage along the Gulf Coast of Louisiana and Mississippi. By the time the ALIVE! Board of Directors met on September 6, ALIVE! was postured to help in many ways and the meeting focused on what we should do and how we should do it. Two days later, ALIVE! issued a press release reminding the City agencies and others in the community that we were ready to help in what ever way we were needed. President Gerry Hebert was quoted in the press release as saying, "ALIVE! has a long and rich history of responding to the needs of people in our community – it's what we do." A separate phone line was established to accept volunteers and new offers of assistance for Katrina victims. We coordinated with the Alexandria Emergency Management Coordinator, Alexandria Red Cross and the Office of Community Services. At this writing, the demand for our assistance has been small but only time will tell what will be needed as other assistance drops off and as some of the Katrina victims settle more permanently into our community. When that time comes, we'll be there. "...it's what we do."

I think most of us are in a state of denial that they will actually leave because they have been such active advocates for the neediest among us for as long as we can remember. Here are just a few things that came to mind as I sat down to write this article.

Do you think there will ever be passenger space in Don's car? Every time I see it, it's full with either food or diapers or prizes for the Bingo games at Ladrey.

Did Joan ever work on Friday afternoons in the 80's? Actually, she took annual leave to prepare dinner at Carpenter's Shelter. Slicing, dicing, always making something delicious with food purchased and donated by the Burchells.

Guess who was in charge of the fabulous auction at the 2003 Fool's ALIVE! celebration?

Joan and Don collected auction items in their condo until it looked a bit like a maze and you'd have to be careful to check before you turned on the shower.

Our Last Saturday Food Program, feeding over 500 families a month, was Joan's brainchild. Don started the ALIVE! 9/11 Assistance Program that helped so many Alexandrians get back on their feet.

Perhaps none will miss Joan and Don more than the senior citizens at Ladrey House. The Burchells have sponsored their Bingo night for years and Joan manages the ALIVE! Last Saturday Food program for the residents, most of whom must live on a small fixed income. Their love and caring are nowhere more evident than when they are serving the Ladrey community.

When it was time for Christ Church to collect food for ALIVE!, the parish children dressed as fruits and vegetables when gathering the donations from the congregation. Whose idea? Joan, again! As you can imagine, we were fortunately inundated with much-needed food.

The ALIVE! holiday gift wrapping at Landmark Mall + another Burchell idea that brought in thousands of dollars and much good will for ALIVE!

The children at Our Little Roses Orphanage in Honduras know Joan and Don, especially one child, now a young lady, who received financial assistance for schooling and moral support from Don and Joan, including many trips to Central America to help.

"Mac", a former street person, now has his own apartment, furniture and a steady income. He has been reunited with his family and, after years of hard times, is able to enjoy some of the simple pleasures we all take for granted. Joan and Don, the guardian angels, were there to help him with every step of his journey to independence.

Both Joan and Don served on the founding board of Carpenter's Shelter, both were President of ALIVE!, and active board members for many years. Don was Treasurer of the Red Cross board, Joan served on the United Way board in Alexandria and the National Capital Region.

Joan and Don were worthy recipients of the Burke award in 2003. This award, presented by the Alexandria Red Cross, is given to those who have contributed outstanding philanthropic and humanitarian service to the Alexandria community.

This is just a brief snapshot of what this couple has been doing for the last several years. It's like the "tip of the iceberg" because there is much, much more I could say. This city has been their home for most of their lives. They attended our schools, married, raised their son, Jeffrey, attended Christ Church, played bridge, worked for a living – the things we all do. Joan and Don also have given so much to those in need, not only financially but with their precious time and considerable talents. Remember being told as a child that you should leave a place better than you found it? Even though none of us want to see Joan and Don Burchell leave Alexandria, we all agree that they have made an outstanding contribution to the Alexandria community and that Alexandria is a better place because of their care and concern for our neediest men, women and children.

# Family Emergency Program Office Gets Extreme Makeover

The Family Emergency Program (FEP) Office received a much needed makeover this summer. A team of seven young people from the Catholic Heart Work Camp (CHWC), part of 350 students from around the country whose purpose was to serve others, eagerly tackled the work of cleaning and painting the FEP office. Two of the teenage girls were skilled in using tools and experienced painters. Other team members cleaned and lined the shelves before replacing the canned goods and boxes of food. The FEP volunteers all agree that it is now a pleasure to work in the cleaner and brighter office.

This same energetic team of seven also cleaned and reorganized the food storage room, painted the Child Development Center's bathrooms, cleaned the storage sheds and washed the children's toys. The teenagers agreed that their favorite activity was water play with the CDC children on a very hot day.

Two other CHWC teams cleaned and organized the housewares storage room and the furniture warehouse. In the evenings, the students returned to Bishop Ireton School, where they were staying, to share their experiences from the various work sites all around Northern Virginia. One young man who had reorganized the ALIVE! furniture warehouse, on a ninety-five degree day

with no air conditioning, shared with the group his story. As he and his exhausted teammates were trying to decide how to dispose of a truck load of trash at the end of a back breaking day, an older man who was a city employee, praised the young people for their work and offered to finish the job of disposing of the trash. The young man told the assembly that "he had seen God today" through the man who offered to finish the job for the tired and thirsty teenagers.

We who worked with the youth are grateful that they chose to spend their summer days making ALIVE! look brighter and better.
