24th Annual *STEP ALIVE!* Walkathon Sunday, May 1st

Join us on Sunday, May 1 at 1:30 pm for the 24th Annual *STEP ALIVE!*, the annual walkathon for the ALIVE! Child Development Center (CDC). Walkers will enjoy a 5-mile scenic loop through Old Town. The start and finish location is at First Christian Church, 2723 King Street. There will be a picnic for all walkers and volunteers immediately following the walk around 3:00 p.m.

The registration fee for the walk is \$10 for adults and \$5 for seniors and youth (children under 10 walk for free). Walkers are encouraged to raise additional funds through pledges of support from friends, family and associates. There are three easy ways to get a pledge form: 1) turn to page 7 of this newsletter; 2) request one from your ALIVE! Congregation Representative; or 3) download one from the ALIVE! website – www.alive-inc.org. Additional information about the walk can also be found online.

ALIVE! CDC is the only program in Alexandria providing subsidized early childhood education, childcare, parent education and family support services to low-income working families. Founded in 1972, the CDC is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). *STEP ALIVE!* is the Center's only community wide fundraising event, last year raising over \$15,000.

ALIVE!Wire Volunteering with ALIVE!– The Spirit is Catching!

When I think back, I can't remember how I learned about ALIVE! Probably it was through my church bulletin which asked for volunteers at Last Saturday Food Distribution. I showed up, and, as they say, that was that. I was hooked. After two months, I volunteered to become the Volunteer Coordinator. (Note: For those of you who are experiencing déjà vu after reading Ken Naser's Letter from the Executive Director, this only stresses the point that the ALIVE! spirit is truly catching!)

In that time, I have come to realize that ALIVE! is much more than the sum of its parts. The magnitude of the assistance ALIVE! provides is deceiving. Many volunteers are aware of just one or two programs and therefore have no idea how far ALIVE! reaches and how many people ALIVE! assists each and every day. It is truly amazing to me that an organization, run almost solely by volunteers, serves 12,000-15,000 needy Alexandrians each year. That is a lot of time, effort, and devotion. Those who volunteer will tell you that the lack of monetary compensation pales in comparison to the spiritual rewards and the good will received.

I invite those of you who haven't yet spent a few hours helping with one of our programs, to do so. Regardless of how much time you have to give, I encourage you to donate an hour or so to ALIVE! Last month, I was at a birthday party for a friend and neighbor of mine. There were about 50 people in attendance, about half of whom I knew. The rest were various acquaintances and co-workers of the birthday honoree. During the evening, a young couple starting chatting with me about work. During the course of the conversation, I asked how they met and about their interests. They in turn asked me about my work and my interests and I stared to talk about ALIVE! I explained to them each of our programs, and then said, as wonderful as all this sounds, it pales in comparison to the personal satisfaction that we receive as volunteers when we give away food, housewares, or furniture to a needy family. I explained how when we deliver or distribute these items, how I have seen recipients praise God for blessing them with bringing ALIVE! volunteers into their lives. I told them how I have seen eyes swell up with tears of joy and gratitude, and how when I saw that happen, it made me feel alive! I explained too that when we help our clients, they know someone in their community is looking out for them, and how recently, one former resident of ALIVE! I spoke with enthusiasm and conviction about how the volunteers working through ALIVE! touched people's lives in a fundamental way by addressing their basic needs of food and shelter.

When I was finished, the man reached into his pocket and pulled out a \$20 bill. He said that a couple of weeks ago, he had found it. He said he asked God to tell him what to do with it. He then said to me, "When you were explaining about all the wonderful things that ALIVE! does, I heard God's voice say to me that it was time for me to give this \$20 away" He then said: "Here, take this \$20 for ALIVE!, God told me to give it you."

ALIVE! House residents recently enjoyed a delicious dinner prepared and served by the Westminster Presbyterian Church Youth Fellowship. Tablecloths and flowers helped make the dinner a special event. Other congregations have expressed an interest, so we plan to make oncea-month Sunday night dinners a tradition.

One of our residents has just completed CNA Training, graduating at the top of her class, and is currently seeking employment in her field. Another resident has received Section 8 housing and is looking forward to planting flowers in her own yard after she and the children move into their new home. The ALIVE! house wares and furniture programs are providing the furnishings. It is really great for ALIVE! House to have this kind of support for its residents!

One of our small bedrooms was painted between residents, transforming the walls from fuchsia to a cheerful pale yellow. A new resident and her daughter have already moved in. A single father with two boys is expected in the near future to occupy a large bedroom.

In the last quarter, we had to turn away 60 people for lack of space. In the same period we provided 1,225 bed nights – 368 for adults and 857 for children. We continue to serve our residents with your support.
