President's Message

I was standing out in the frigid weather the other day waiting for a friend to pick me up. He got caught in traffic and the sub-freezing temperatures almost became unbearable after awhile. Besides, I had skipped lunch. It was dinnertime and I was hungry. Fortunately for me, my friend eventually arrived and I went home, and soon I was in my warm house and eating dinner. As I stood there that day though, I wondered, what about the many people I see in Alexandria each week who have no warm home to go to? Or who are hungry every day?

One of the best things about being ALIVE! President is that I get to be among some of the most generous volunteers I have ever met. They are generous with their time, with their money, and perhaps most importantly, with their spirit. I have witnessed ALIVE! volunteers transform the weary faces of the poor in a matter of minutes, by carrying into their new public housing unit furniture that has been donated to us by people like you, or by carrying bags of canned goods from the ALIVE food pantry to their dinner table and filling their bare cupboards with food donated at the Turkey Trot race, or some other local food drive. I have also seen the relief on the face of a young single mother, whose eviction is prevented when, through no fault of their own, they fell behind a little in rent and ALIVE! comes to the rescue. I see the human spirit uplifted each week in my work for ALIVE! and it is the most meaningful thing I do in my life.

Stretching the Dollar with FEP

Recently someone asked if the Family Emergency Program (FEP) had enough money each month. The answer is that we never have enough money to fill all of the requests we receive. We all know what has happened just this year to the cost of living in our city. Every single month we spend the money budgeted before the end of the month.

We know that we are helping families and individuals to keep the electricity on, to stay warm in the winter, to pay for essential medications and to rescue families from becoming homeless. With ALIVE!'s emergency assistance of \$100 per household every three months, it doesn't seem like much of a band aid, but the city social workers are wizards at putting together several sources of money and count on ALIVE's funds to help clients pay their bills.

Every request for help that the FEP volunteers receive has a compelling story. On a recent Monday volunteers handled 25 requests for help. Here are some recent examples:

A hospital social worker called and asked if ALIVE! could pay for a motel room for just one night for a patient being discharged who wasn't well enough to stay in a homeless shelter. He needed a place to stay to give him time to work on finding a room to rent to match his disability income.

A mother and child needed emergency rental assistance because the restaurant where the mother worked cut her hours down to two days a week. She had already arranged for an interview at another restaurant with the hope of being able to make enough money to get by. She needed the money to stave off an eviction notice.

The last referral received was for an elderly gentleman taking twelve different prescription medications who desperately needed to fill at least the most essential ones to survive. By the time the request was received, we were out of money; therefore the volunteer asked the social worker if a delivery of food from ALIVE! would save the man enough money to pay for some medicine. Due to the generosity of the churches and community groups who had donated food during the holidays at least we could offer him food.

Over half of FEP's budget is spent on utility bills each month. Last year ALIVE! helped one thousand people pay their electric, gas or water bills.

FEP's staff of 35 volunteers are very proud of the fact that every request is carefully considered and sound decisions are made in determining how ALIVE! can help those in need. Our job is to use the donors' money wisely. So again, the answer is "YES," ALIVE! FEP runs out of money every month. We wish instead that we could say we have accomplished ALIVE!'s mission to eliminate poverty in our city.
