President's Message

One reality show I actually enjoyed watching was "Extreme Makeover, Home Edition". In it, a family leaves their run down home and returns after a few days blindfolded; when the blindfolds are removed, they find their place has been transformed into a thing of beauty. They are overwhelmed when they see it. They cry. They hug the show's producers and the workers. They cry some more. And the tears they cry are tears of joy and gratefulness. So what does this have to do with ALIVE!?



Well, if you've ever been part of our furniture team, which delivers furniture every Saturday of the year, you know why the reality show reminds me of ALIVE!'s work. People who have been homeless are provided public or subsidized housing. It comes completely unfurnished. They arrive with little more than the clothes on their backs. ALIVE!'s family emergency program is called by city social workers and supplies some food. ALIVE!'s housewares committee delivers pots, pans, towels, and other items. And then, usually on the following Saturday, our faithful servants on the furniture committee arrive. And the person once homeless watches as a couch, chairs, beds, dressers and a dinette set are brought in. And suddenly, what was once a lifeless empty apartment is now ALIVE! again. It's ALIVE!'s edition of the extreme makeover!

To me these transformations are quite spiritual. Not just because you see an empty apartment become a warm and friendly home in just a matter of minutes. But it's the uplifting of the spirit of the poor that makes it so. You see people who have been in such desperate situations finally given a roof over their heads—a place they can call home. And they now have food to feed themselves and their children. And for the first time in a long time, they have possessions—silverwares,

I don't know what that means but I'm sure happy there is a school that helps kids like me.

Thank you Santa.

Maybe soon I will be in school with other children to learn and grow - even if we don't have a lot of money.

Notes from the Executive Director

The calls for emergency assistance increase as the resources to meet those needs decline. A recent survey done at the National level reflects exactly what we are experiencing on the local level at ALIVE! here in Alexandria. Consistently, throughout the country, those providing emergency assistance to people in need are finding that the requests for food and financial assistance for essential items such as rent, utilities and medical prescriptions, are on the increase while the contributions to help meet those needs are not keeping up.


Rev. Larry Snyder, president of Catholic Charities USA which conducted the study, says “Year after year, we continue to see that requests for help are growing much faster than the money to provide assistance, putting continued strain on social services.” And, eighty percent of the requests for emergency assistance are coming from the working poor.

As we approach the time of year when great emphasis is on perusing the retail flyers, running up the credit card bills with our spending, and indulging at too many holiday parties, perhaps this is a time to reflect on our priorities with our families and friends.

NON-PROFIT PROVIDES FREE HOME REPAIRS

Is your home in need of rehabilitation or repair? Are you a low-income Alexandria homeowner? Rebuilding Together Alexandria (formerly Christmas in April) is seeking homeowners who need assistance with home repairs. Teams of volunteers work on many houses throughout Alexandria, repairing and renovating homes so that homeowners may continue to live in warmth, safety, and independence. All repairs are made at no expense to you!

Founded in 1986 by Barbara Joseph, Alexandria Christmas in April (as we were originally known) held its first 'rebuilding day' in 1987. On that last Saturday in April, 8 homes and 2 shelters were repaired, at no cost to the homeowners, by 174 volunteers. Last year, 850 volunteers worked on 72 homes and non-profit agencies—throughout the year and on National Rebuilding Day (the last Saturday in April). Now known as Rebuilding Together Alexandria, we've repaired and rehabilitated nearly 1,000 Alexandria residents' homes and non-profit agencies; repairing leaking roofs, replacing broken windows, building handicap ramps, replacing electrical systems, painting, and so much more.

Rebuilding Together Alexandria is a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the quality of life for low-income Alexandria homeowners.

Crowds Turn Out for Walkathon!

A beautiful day and beautiful people - the friends of ALIVE! House were down on the National Mall proving with their presence that they support the work of the shelter. Individuals ranging in age from a few months to over 80 years were part of the enormous crowd.

Contingents came from ALIVE! House (residents, former residents, staff, friends), Beverly Hills UMC, Blessed Sacrament Catholic Community, Downtown Baptist Church, Hylton High School, Marymount University, Old Presbyterian Meeting House, TC Williams (the Keyettes and Club Zonta), Trinity UMC, and Westminster Presbyterian Church. Adding in the happy feet from Mini-Walks at Grace Episcopal School, St. Rita School, and Washington Street UMC, it is expected that the final count will be over 250 walkers, earning an incentive of \$5000 from the Fannie Mae Foundation. ALIVE! House also benefits from their registration fees and sponsors.

Additional funds were raised by the generous contributions of three Partners, each donating \$1500 to the Help the Homeless Campaign: Fairlington UMC,, Immanuel Church the Hill and an anonymous donor on The participation of ALIVE! It is probably a good idea to include the address in the event the executor or trustee is not in the local area.

Caring for those in need all year long

The ALIVE! Family Emergency Program's (FEP) mission is to provide needy Alexandrians with emergency food and emergency funds for utilities, rent, medical services and prescriptions, thus feeding the hungry, preventing evictions, keeping the utilities from being turned off and providing for medical needs. Clients are eligible to receive a three day supply of food once a month and funds up to \$100 every three months.

One appreciative great grandmother counts on ALIVE's food and funds and volunteers to assist her throughout the year. She has already raised her children, but now finds herself at age 70 raising a teenage granddaughter who has an acute illness. In addition, she is also raising three great grandchildren. The youngest child is 20 months old and was recently diagnosed with a life threatening illness.

The great grandmother's caseworker checks with the family regularly to see that the family has food to eat and adequate shelter. Throughout the year, the FEP food drivers have delivered many bags of nutritious food for the hungry family. Recently, ALIVE! paid \$100 toward the family's gas bill to keep the heat on, which is extremely important with two children in the household with serious illnesses.

It is hard to believe that in our beautiful wealthy City of Alexandria that there are families living in poverty and going hungry. While most Alexandrians are fortunate enough to be able to decide on the latest electronic toy to buy their children and grandchildren for Christmas, others are deciding which bill to pay, the rent, utility or medical bill. Sometimes those bills cannot be paid when there are hungry children checking the empty pantry and refrigerator. The great grandmother in this story faces these choices daily.

When you are writing your end-of-year checks, please consider writing one to ALIVE! INC. The 45 volunteers in the Family Emergency Office promise you that they will be good stewards of your contribution as together we help the most vulnerable residents in our city.

Last year 3,318 bags of emergency food were delivered to 1079 households consisting of 1,472 adults and 783 children. In addition, emergency funds in the amount of \$186,842 were provided to 2,197 low income Alexandrians.
