Food Distribution programs inspire all of us by their compassion and energy to make a difference in the lives of the strangers who line up for food. Both our volunteers and donors are finding through their involvement with ALIVE! something of immense value. #### PLANNED GIVING

If you are required to take an IRA distribution, make it a tax deduction, too! Did you know – for 2006 and 2007, IRA owners age 70-1/2 or older can direct the IRA custodian to make a distribution directly to a charity? The distribution, up to \$100,000 each year, is <u>federally tax-free</u> and can be used to satisfy part or all of the <u>required minimum</u> distribution (RMD). #### LANDMARK MACY'S HELP "BAG HUNGER"

Many children look forward to the end of school and being able to 'have fun' in the summer months. But hunger is most prevalent during those months when children are not in school and the tendency for children to go hungry increases



without the before-school programs. It is a very difficult time for low-income families, the homeless, and it's also a time when the food banks' supplies become seriously depleted. Macy's recognized this need and the opportunity to build community ties in many ways. 'Bag Hunger' is just one of the many programs Macy's has set up to give back to the community.

The kick off for 'Bag Hunger' began with a visit from Ken Naser of ALIVE! where he introduced the employees to the organization and what it means to the community. Ken mentioned several of ALIVE!'s out-reach programs and gave the employees much to think about.

Apparently the energy that came out of this introduction was contagious! Macy's associates collected food and donations to buy food, which was distributed to many needy families and children in our local community. In addition, cash contributions to buy food exceeded \$3,000. This year represents the tenth year this program has been in operation. The associates at Landmark Macy's are very proud to give back to the community and are pleased to join with ALIVE! to do so. They ask us to always remember that no amount is too small, a lending hand is always reached for and as a community working together, we can build a strong, healthy community.

#### State of the Furniture Committee Report

One statistic tells it best: this year we benefited from over 2,500 volunteer hours--a new record high for the committee. Those hours are more than 50% higher than a decade ago, which is as far back as my records go. Two decades ago, when I first volunteered with the committee, often the Saturday morning crew was two guys and a little red pickup truck. We didn't go out on holiday weekends, and from time to time we had to cancel a Saturday morning run altogether because we had no volunteers. Now we send out trucks every weekend-- one truck on holiday weekends; two on all others. In addition to the driver and shotgun, the trucks frequently leave with one, two, or even three volunteers in a chase car.

Of course, statistics can't tell the whole story. The good news is that the picture beyond the statistics is even more encouraging. Years ago, women seldom went out with the crews--nowadays, we seldom have a Saturday morning without at least one woman on each truck. Additionally, three of the committee's regularly scheduled drivers are women.

The trend for young volunteers is just as encouraging. "Back then" the volunteers were in their 40's, 50's and up. These days we have fathers with sons, mothers with daughters, Boy Scout troops, and church youth groups. Students at Bishop Ireton (BI) High School have connected with the committee to fulfill their required community service, including at times, members of their baseball, football, and wrestling teams.

In the final analysis, the furniture committee is only as good as its volunteers. So I am delighted to report to you that we continued on page 6

#### Sierra Club Donates Energy-Saving Lights to Low Income Families by

A joint project by ALIVE! and the Sierra Club has begun placing energy-efficient bulbs in the hands of hundreds of families who apply for emergency assistance. The idea behind it is to get people to use compact fluorescent lights (CFLs) in their homes, where the CFLs can cut lighting costs, as well as reduce the heat generated by old-style incandescent bulbs.

"Since mid-summer, we've distributed nearly 1,000 of the cost-saving CFL bulbs through our Family Emergency Program," said ALIVE Executive Director Ken Naser. These bulbs save significant amounts of electricity compared with traditional incandescents and are much cooler than the finger-scorching bulbs they replace. They cost much more to purchase, however, they pay for themselves in energy savings within a few months. Families that install them will pay lower monthly bills to light their homes.

"Sierra Club grants pay for the bulbs," said Naser, "and our volunteers include a small start-up packet of CFLs with each batch of emergency supplies, so that families can put them into the light fixtures they use most often. We think it can help families start to save permanently on their electricity bills and be one more tool to help them gain financial control of their lives."

The idea began with local resident Carolyn Cason. "I started using these bulbs myself this year, and was so impressed by them that I wanted to find a way to help get them in the hands of those who could least afford them," Cason said. "I realized that the \$2-\$5 that stores charge per bulb might seem too high to many families, while the monthly energy savings are not as easy to see at first. There have been times when I struggled with my monthly bills, so I appreciate how tough it can be to pay more for something right now even if the result is long-term savings."

She brought the idea for the donation program to Bruce Parker, Global Warming Chair for the Sierra Club's Mount Vernon Chapter, and to the ALIVE! Board. Both Sierra Club and ALIVE! saw how a grant program could help more families adopt this simple way to cut energy use. Parker encouraged her to apply for grants from the club's local chapter foundation, as well as the national office, and both offices awarded grants for the project earlier this summer. "Carolyn's project is getting CFLs to people who cannot afford to buy them, and in the process, is both helping them conserve energy and educating them about the importance of reducing greenhouse gas emissions," said Parker. "This is an essential part of a strategy we must pursue if we are to have any chance of avoiding the worst consequences of global warming."

Since then, Cason has been regularly buying the bulbs and delivering them to ALIVE!'s Family Emergency Program. She also prepared flyers to be include with each CFL packet that explains this "Smart Lights" program and benefits of using the spiral lights.

"A big part of ALIVE!'s mission is not only to help families through a rough patch," said Naser, "but to also help them learn new ways to manage their expenses. Showing them the cost-cutting advantages of CFLs is, at first glance, a small thing, but it can show them how to spend less on lighting bills for the rest of their lives. That's a real victory for them and will help stretch our Family Emergency budget for how much we can spend on utility assistance."
