The President's Message

## ALIVE!'s 40th Year: Celebratory and Challenging

ALIVE! was founded in May 1969, by farsighted lay leaders and clergy from a few congregations, meeting together at Fairlington United Methodist Church. By the end of its first year, ALIVE! included 17 affiliated congregations of different faiths and traditions, working together to provide food, clothing and emergency financial assistance to those in greatest need in our community. Soon thereafter, the dedicated leadership of this budding organization opened an early-childhoodeducation center, furniture and housewares recycling programs, and a shelter for women and families.

Throughout calendar year 2009, we will acknowledge and celebrate the leadership of ALIVE!'s founders and the results that ALIVE! has been able to achieve during its 40 years of service to Alexandrians. Each month will offer a special opportunity to commemorate ALIVE!'s history, starting with:

- a special Board meeting and opening celebration on Tuesday evening, Jan. 6 at Beth El Hebrew Congregation
- participation in the George Washington's Birthday parade on Monday, Feb. 16
- a 40th anniversary "Birthday Party" for ALIVE! on Sunday afternoon, March 8, at Westminster Presbyterian Church.

Even while celebrating its past accomplishments, however, ALIVE! also must focus on continuing to serve the community in the future. Given current economic conditions, the year 2009 could well become one of the most challenging years ALIVE! has ever faced. The number of families needing assistance from ALIVE! is increasing rapidly. For example, from September to October alone ALIVE!'s food programs experienced a 20 plus percentage increase in demand. And this is serious, authenticated need, by families referred by private-agency and City social workers. There have been times when our food-delivery volunteers, upon making a delivery,

## Notes from the Executive Director

As I write this, I have just returned from a community forum, "Moving Ahead in Hard Times: A candid conversation about the realities of the economic crisis and the effect it has on the most vulnerable families," sponsored by the Women's Giving Circle

of Alexandria. The panel featured City Council Member Rob Krupicka; Debra Collins, Assistant City Manager for Community and Human Services, and Terri Freeman, Executive Director of the Community Foundation of the National Capital Region, and the discussion centered on how the many organizations serving those most in need in our community will be able to respond to the conditions brought about by an already fragile economy.

The signs are already there – increases in the numbers of people seeking assistance who've never before needed it. Our Family Emergency and Last Saturday Food Distribution Programs saw a significant jump in requests for food assistance in October. Up about twenty-three percent compared to the previous month. All indications are that this is just the beginning. And, the once-reliable resources organizations like ALIVE! depended upon for support will not necessarily be available to us. For example, grant funds from local government are likely to be reduced or eliminated to meet other needs as sales and real estate tax revenues fall. Support from small foundations that depend on earnings from their investments to make their grants is drying up in a faltering economy, and some funding sources have disappeared.

While the conversation was serious, there was a great feeling of positive energy in the room about

how agencies, organizations and individuals can work together to meet the big challenge before us. For almost forty years, we have depended on the support of caring individuals and organizations to help us meet the demand for assistance from those less fortunate in our community. As jobs are lost and people are faced with a rough economy, requests to ALIVE! for helping meet very basic needs will increase dramatically. We will need to be diligent as well as creative in figuring out how we as a caring community respond to this call.

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## **ALIVE! Programs and Descriptions of Gifts**

A. ALIVE! House ▶ Temporary housing for women and families in emergency and transitional situations. ALIVE! House provides 6-12 months of shelter, support, and help developing life skills for up to four homeless families at a time.

- A1 Bus tokens or Metro Fare cards: Provide transportation for a formerly homeless woman to get to class or a job interview \$ 8
- A2 Ice cream treats: Provide an ice cream treat for displaced children living in ALIVE! House with their mothers \$10
- A3 Dress for Success: Formerly homeless women need professional clothes to enter or re-enter the workforce.

Your donation will purchase a gift card to a local store \$100

- B. Child Development Center (CDC) ► A full-day preschool and early childhood education facility serving up to 46 children of working, poor Alexandrians throughout the year. Tuition and fees are based upon the parents' ability to pay.
- B1 Educational Game or Toy: Provide a 3-pound tub of play dough or a floor puzzle for a classroom \$15
- B2 Cooking Activity: Allow a class to have a fun, new experience and learn how to prepare a nutritious snack for themselves. Your gift provides the food and materials needed \$25
- B3 Nutritious Food: Learning to eat and enjoy healthy food is important for preschoolers.

  Provide nutritious lunch and healthy snacks for one child for one week \$35
- B4 Books: Help make reading at home a habit for a child.

Your gift will buy a set of beginning reading books for a child, selected by the CDC's social worker. \$40

- B5 Tuition: An early childhood education experience is critical to prepare a special needs child for kindergarten. Help a family pay for one week's tuition for their child to attend the CDC \$200
- C. Family Emergency Program ▶ Assistance with rent, utilities, and medical expenses, as requested by social service agencies or clergy of member congregations. Also donates canned and packaged food, for a week of meals, delivered by volunteers to almost 1,000 needy families each year.
- C1 Eggs: Provide a dozen eggs for five families in need as a primary source of protein \$9
- C2 Medication: Prescriptions are becoming more expensive.

Your gift will provide the co-payment for a senior citizen otherwise unable to afford to fill prescriptions. \$50

- C3 Utilities: Help a minimum-wage family pay for a portion of their heating bill for one month this winter \$75
- D. Housewares ▶ Donate housewares, including lamps, towels, sheets, dishes, silverware, pots, and pans, delivered on Saturdays.
- D1 Towels: Purchase new bath and kitchen towels for a family moving into an apartment from a battered women's shelter \$35
- D2 Pots and Pans: Families moving from a shelter need all types of housewares for their new home.

While many are donated to ALIVE!, your gift will buy a new set of pots and pans for a family. \$50

- E. Furniture ▶ Donate beds, tables, chairs, chests, and other useable furniture, picked up and delivered by volunteers to five to ten needy families each weekend.
- E1 Bookshelves: Encourage reading by donating bookshelves to a family with little furniture. \$25
- E2 Gas: Provide enough gas for one truck to pick up and deliver furniture to five needy families on a Saturday morning \$55
- F. Last Saturday Food Distribution ► A five-day supply of surplus fresh produce and staple foods distributed by volunteers once a month to serve over 2,700 families each year referred by social service agencies and ALIVE! congregations.
- F1 Holiday Turkeys Provide a 10-pound turkey to a family for them to enjoy a traditional family meal during the holidays \$10
- F2 Beef Stew: Provide a case of beef stew (24 cans) as a quick, nutritious dinner for twelve families \$17
- F3 Tuna: Purchase a case of tuna (48 cans) to provide two dozen families with an alternative source of protein \$35
- F4 Folding tables: The hundreds of pounds of food donated during ALIVEI's many food drives need to be sorted before being stored. Purchase one of the six commercial folding tables needed at the warehouse to help sort the donations \$47

## Ways to Feed the Hungry

The world is having a food crisis! One billion people a day do not have enough food to eat. It is not in God's plan that the poor and the hungry take care of themselves.

Here are some ways you can help:

- Pray. Thank God for your abundance and ask that He make you ever mindful of the needs of others.
- Food Pantry. Purchase and donate much needed items for ALIVE!'s Food Pantry. Peanut butter and jelly, tuna, spam, Progresso canned soup, fruit flavored Jell-O, Jiffy cornbread mix, complete pancake mixes (only require water) are needed.
- Take one night a month and eat a simple family meal. Donate what you would have spent on a night out at a restaurant, to feed the poor. Write your check to ALIVE!; mark food program on the memo line; and send it to us at 2723 King Street, Alexandria, VA 22302.
- Volunteer to help deliver food for the Family Emergency Program or help at the Last Saturday Food Distribution. Go to ALIVE!'s web site at alive-inc.com and click the Volunteers tab to register as a volunteer for the Food Program.
- Pray some more. Know that what ever you are able to offer, God will take it and bless it and share it with the world.

The West End Congregations Help the Homeless Mini-Walk at Ft. Ward on November 9th was a big success. This combined effort of Beth El Hebrew Congregation, Fairlington Presbyterian, Fairlington United Methodist, and Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill, the Mini-walk registered 82 walkers of all ages and raised over \$2000. The walk benefited ALIVE! House, which is the oldest continuously-operated shelter for women and families in Virginia. The Mini-walk was a preliminary for the November 22nd Help the Homeless Walkathon on the Mall in Washington, also sponsored by Fannie Mae. Proceeds from the Walkathon and Mini-Walks represent over 25% of the ALIVE! House annual budget. Other Mini Walks were held at St. Rita School and Grace Episcopal School. Thanks to all who contributed to this great effort to support our shelter!
