

Congregations: ALIVE!'s Roots

As we reach the midpoint of ALIVE!'s 40th anniversary year, I find myself thinking back to ALIVE!'s origins and reflecting on the sources of support that have sustained ALIVE! ever since. ALIVE! was founded by 17 visionary congregations of different faiths, which acknowledged their common values by coming together to serve those in greatest need in the City of Alexandria. Within just a few years they had created the core programs that ALIVE! continues to deliver today: food, shelter, early childhood education, household furnishings, and emergency monetary assistance.

Over the years, as ALIVE!'s programs have evolved and expanded, ALIVE! has received more and more support from secular sources: government, foundations, businesses and associations, individual donors, and volunteers from the community. However, affiliated congregations, now 41 in number, remain at the root of ALIVE!. The congregations send representatives to serve on ALIVE!'s Board of Directors. They provide financial support, volunteers, client referrals, and donations of food, furniture and housewares. They organize fundraisers for ALIVE! and provide work crews for special projects. They help keep ALIVE! alive.

Congregational Representatives Bring Congregations Together

Representatives from ALIVE!s affiliated congregations serve on the ALIVE! Board of Directors and keep their congregations connected with each other and involved in ALIVE!'s work. As part of this effort, Margie Carpenter, Westminster Presbyterian; Dave Taylor, First Agape Baptist; Beth Mc Farland, Fairlington Presbyterian; and Ann Marie Hay, Unitarian Universalist of Arlington, made presentations to the Board describing the things they have done to involve their congregations in ALIVE!'s work. They demonstrated that effective congregational reps are well-informed about ALIVE's programs, needs, and current challenges.

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Notes from the Executive Director



Ken Naser, ALIVE!'s Executive Director

In May of this year, the ALIVE! monthly board meeting was held in the Fellowship Hall of Fairlington United Methodist Church, the same room where the very first meeting of ALIVE! was held 40 years earlier. Throughout this anniversary year, many have been involved in various activities and efforts to celebrate this milestone. In this issue you'll see pictures that capture some of those activities and you'll read about how our many different congregations continue to stay involved.

The annual report of the first year of ALIVE! is quite an interesting read. It documents the fact that during the first year, seventeen congregations became members. Those vintage minutes also spelled out three simple qualifications for congregations to belong to ALIVE! Later incorporated into the ALIVE! bylaws, those qualifications were: commit to participate in the "ruling body" (the Board); designate a congregational representative; and, commit to provide funds.

The last qualification had a parenthetical goal spelled out, too, for providing funds. It read, "ALIVE!'s goal for funds is \$3.00 per year from each member family in your congregation..." That seems pretty modest. But, imagine what that would mean if we had the same goal today... \$3.00 (adjusted for 40 years of inflation, of course, would still be only \$17.43) for each member family in

our 41 member congregations. I think we'd be in a better position to meet the current demands on our programs caused by the very challenging economy facing us today.

We really appreciate the active and supportive congregations that you will read about in this issue. But, we'd like all 41 members to be active and supportive. If your congregation is not active any longer, think about changing that. I am available to work with any individual or group to see how we can get your congregation re-engaged in ALIVE!'s important service to our community. Give me a call. (703) 837-9320. *Ken*

Joe Murray, Vice President of Construction handed out plaques to the participating trades. All enjoyed a delicious lunch and cake decorated with the ALIVE! logo before taking a tour to see the results for themselves.

ALIVE! House is truly grateful to all who made this renovation so successful, a long list, - and for those who eased the process, especially: The Old Town Residence Inn By Marriott which housed the residents, and Boyd Walker who gave the Director office space, telephone & internet for the

duration of the work. We thank HomeAid the pro bono part of the Northern Virginia

Cold, damp, disagreeable – that was the weather. Warm, excited, joyful - that was the atmosphere as ALIVE! House celebrated the renovation of the interior of the building on April 22nd. Thanks to K. Hovnanian Homes, the "Builder Captain" and their many trade partners, there now are fully equipped kitchens on each floor, bright shining bathrooms, laundry areas, new flooring, new furniture, - and even new gutters!

ALIVE! House is the oldest continuously operating shelter for women in Northern Virginia, providing a safe home for women and families while helping them develop the necessary life skills to achieve independent living. Located in the heart of Old Town Alexandria, the townhouse was built in 1820 and was previously renovated in 1994 when an addition was built to add living space.

In addition to a basement that is used primarily for storage, the house has three floors. The first has an administrative office for ALIVE! House Director, Dimitri Warren, and an efficiency apartment for the House Manager, Ben Carruthers, who is there in the evenings and weekends. Each of the two upper floors has one large and one small bedroom for the residents, a bathroom, and a common living area which provides a sitting area with television, dining area, a washer/ dryer, and now a kitchen. This much needed renovation included lighting fixtures, window treatments and newly painted walls for a

A Face-to-Face Meeting Made My Day! By Linda Coleman, Chair of the Family Emergency Program

Those of us who volunteer for ALIVE!'s Family Emergency Program (FEP) are justly proud of the fact that our program is the only one in the city of Alexandria that delivers emergency food to hungry Alexandrians³ homes. Since January of this year FEP drivers have made over 400 deliveries.

As Chair of FEP, I spend most of my time on administrative tasks and seldom get the opportunity to meet those Alexandrians face-to-face. It's my loss. Earlier this year, however, I had occasion to call a gentleman, one who regularly is referred to us for emergency food by Alexandria's Department of Human Services, to see if he'd be home that day for a delivery. During our brief conversation, he mentioned that he'd soon be celebrating his 90th birthday.

As a break from my usual routine, I visited the gentleman a day or two after his birthday, taking with me a few extra food items from our pantry and a birthday dessert. I very much enjoyed meeting him and learning about this life-long Alexandrian. He lives alone, having lost his wife several years ago. They had no children. He's relatively healthy, has a wonderful attitude, and is somehow making ends meet on \$900 a month.....with a little help from others.

I am so glad that ALIVE! is there for this gentleman and so many others like him. In fact, he called me just hours after my visit to his home and said to me, "You've got to tell the volunteers that the only reason I've lived to be 90 years old is because they bring food to me. Now don't you forget to tell them!". I did tell the volunteers, and now I'm passing this story on to all of you. Without your support, our work on behalf of those in need would not be possible.

Danielle Young and 34 other "at risk" preschool students learn and play at the Child Development Center run by ALIVE! in large part because of the individuals and member congregations that support our annual walkathon, which was held on May 3rd. ALIVE! has operated the Child Development Center for children-at-risk-for-school- failure at First Christian Church for 37 years and for 28 of those, the Walkathon has helped fund it.

An energetic 5 year old who loves to draw and sculpt Gizmo the guinea pig,

Danielle has been at the preschool for three years and has made great strides in language and social skills, according to center director Pam Blankenship. Her mother, Tiffany Oliphant, has a full time job and is able to drop her at the center early in the morning and pick her up after 5 pm. Oliphant says that Danielle is ready for kindergarten next year but will miss her friends, teachers, pets and toys at the CDC. When she is sick, she hates to miss a day, even when she has taken home one of her favorite toys like Charlotte the giant spider.

The ALIVE! CDC is open 51 weeks a year so that working families have a safe and secure place to educate their children.
