Since I am now President—and excited about the opportunity--I guess there's no surprise that, at least in my view, ALIVE! is well-positioned to serve those in need in Alexandria and to do it well.

In my first opportunity to talk to those who care about ALIVE! through the Wire, I thought I'd give you my view of ALIVE! and some of what we will be doing with our resources in the next few months. First, let me thank Diana Day for her service as President of ALIVE! and say that I view Diana as a major resource for ALIVE!, not only over the past two years, but in her many years before that and in what I hope will be many years going forward. Diana brought her focus, commitment and high standards to the position of President, and I am particularly grateful for her focus on improving ALIVE! 's structure and processes, especially in the areas of finance and accounting, development activities, and outreach to our member congregations.

As I have spent some time working in each of the program areas, I have come to appreciate first-hand perhaps the greatest resources of ALIVE!, that is the strong leadership we have in our program committee chairs and officers. Diana recognized them in her last column but I want to add my thanks for these incredible individuals who devote countless hours to ALIVE!'s mission, generally behind the scenes, assuring that hundreds of families are blessed each month by their work and the work of the dozens of volunteers whom they coordinate. ALIVE! RECEIVES MAJOR BEQUEST

Helen King Omer (at right) was a vibrant, unassuming woman who lived for the last 40 years of her life in the Beverley Hills neighborhood of Alexandria. She attended Westminster Presbyterian Church, one of ALIVE!'s member congregations. Her friends and neighbors knew that her husband, Colonel Daniel Omer, had left her financially secure but few knew that she was a wealthy woman. When Helen died in 2008, she left part of her estate to ALIVE! and recently, we received a check for



just over \$600,000 to further our mission.

Since two former presidents of ALIVE! lived on her small cul de sac, Helen was aware of ALIVE!'s role in Alexandria and knew of its culture of volunteer involvement. "She hoped that her gift to ALIVE! would serve as an incentive to others to contribute to the important work of our organization" said Cathy Thompson, who had been a close friend of Helen's for many years.

In discussing how the bequest would be used, Ken Naser, ALIVE!'s Executive Director, pointed out that ALIVE! is undergoing a long-range planning process to determine how we can better our programs to more successfully meet the critical needs of Alexandria's low-income residents. Several advisors have suggested that the Helen Omer bequest be invested so that ALIVE! would be able to utilize the dividends gained from the investment on an annual basis. A Committee has been established to explore various options.

Pumpkins Benefit Those in Need

For over 17 years Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill has covered their church yard with beautiful multi-colored pumpkins that their members sell to benefit non-profits, most of which are in the Alexandria area—including ALIVE! The pumpkins are grown on a Navajo Indian reservation in New Mexico and shipped in on trucks by the supplier.

The project takes months of preparation and the help of hundreds of the church's regular worshipers, who volunteer to unload, size, and sell the gourds as well as cooking soups, stews and sweets for sale at the fundraiser. The church donates all profits to charity and pumpkins not purchased are given to help feed rescued animals.

This year's sale begins Sunday, Oct. 3rd and runs through Halloween on Oct. 31st. The church is at 3606 Seminary Road and the Pumpkin Patch is open 10 AM to 8 PM daily.

Looking for Warehouse Space

I'm writing this article in the hopes that several hundreds of pairs of eyes and minds are better than one.

ALIVE!'s furniture committee is searching for warehouse space. For more than a year, we have been using space in the old Avis Rental Car maintenance facility in Potomac Yards, compliments of the City and the developer. This is our typical mode of operations -- using vacant space, rent-free, that is awaiting development. In the past 20 years we've occupied more than half a dozen spaces, including two in what is now the Cameron Station community (an ammunition bunker and the four seasons store of the old Army base.) I have to admit that the ammunition bunker was a bit creepy -- even by our standards!



Renting space is not an option. As long as there is one family in town that is wrestling with the question of whether to feed the family or pay the electric bill, the money is better spent by the Family Emergency Program than paying for storage space--which leaves us where we are. In July, the developer told us that construction had progressed to the point where we needed to vacate the Potomac Yards facility. The City of Alexandria has helped by providing office-type space in the old public health building in the 500 block of N. St Asaph Street. However, access is through a narrow door and up a half flight of stairs. Since



we try to place donated items the same day we pick them up, the St Asaph Street location helps us when we have those odds and ends that don't match between donations and requests on any given Saturday. However, because of the limited space and accessibility, we cannot accept large donations (e.g., mattresses offered in bulk by hotels). As a consequence, we are hampered in our efforts to help our neighbors in need.

What we seek is one to two thousand square feet of covered space, readily accessible at ground level to our box trucks. God has met the needs of the furniture committee for over 40 years -- in many cases through "leads" such as yours.

added some new resources in the new officers and committee chairs who have stepped up to take on new tasks within ALIVE! (See the summer Wire for more information).

We have a number of exciting activities underway this year:

1) Long Range Planning—Diana Day has agreed to chair our efforts to develop a long range plan for ALIVE!. It is an excellent time, following our 40th anniversary last year, to examine our strengths and weaknesses as well as the many needs in our community. A long range plan will allow ALIVE! to decide how to best utilize our resources and take advantage of opportunities to better serve those less fortunate in Alexandria.

2) Development—Under the leadership of Marian Van Landingham, ALIVE!'s Development Council is taking the next step of reaching out to individuals, businesses, foundations and associations to enhance the financial resources of ALIVE!. A contractor is being retained to follow through on the work of the Council and help us meet the generous challenge grant offered by Gene Steuerle. (See the previous edition of the Wire).

3) Child Development Center Accreditation—Building on a strong 4-star rating by the State, Ellen Brown and Pam Blankenship (CDC Director), are working toward accreditation by NAEYC (the National Association for the Education of Young Children). A major step forward was taken last year by the CDC, when the Center achieved a 100% score in five of the 10 NAEYC standards, but our application for accreditation was deferred pending improvement in certain other standards. After a focus on the needs in these areas over the summer, the CDC will be reapplying this fall and we are hopeful to have full accreditation by NAEYC early next year.

4) New Database—As the result of a generous grant from ACT for Alexandria, ALIVE! is in the process of transitioning our database to eTapestry which will significantly improve our ability to keep track of our donors, volunteers and others. Ken Naser has been overseeing this project and Vivian Webb, Bob Barnett and Jim Ring have been donating countless hours to update the files and assure a smooth transition.

There are many other resources that I haven't mentioned, including our dedicated staff and the strong financial and volunteer support from our member congregations. All of our resources are important and will be needed as we work toward our goal of "helping people faced with emergency situations or long-term needs become capable of assuming self-reliant roles in the community."

If you can give more of your time and energy or your financial resources, please join us in this work.

A. ALIVE! House \Rightarrow Temporary housing for women and families in emergency and transitional situations.

1	Bus tokens or Metro Fare cards	Provide transportation for a formerly homeless woman to get to class or a job interview.	\$10
2	Cleaning Supplies	Provide a family with a month's supply of laundry, bathroom and kitchen cleaners and paper products.	\$25
3	Work Clothes	Purchase a Target or TJ Maxx gift card to help a homeless single mom buy work clothes or shoes.	\$40
4	Towels	Provide a family with a new set of face and bath towels as a welcome gift.	\$75

B. Child Development Center (CDC) \Rightarrow A full-day preschool and early childhood education facility serving up to 38 children of working, poor Alexandrians. Tuition and fees are based upon the parents' ability to pay.

1	Hats & Gloves	Purchase a hat and gloves/mittens to allow a child to play outside comfortably even on the coldest of days.	\$15
2	Finger Paint Supplies	Provide five 16-ounce bottles of tempera paint and two pads of finger paint paper to outfit a classroom	\$30
3	Nutritious Food	Provide materials for one class to plan and prepare two nutritious snacks.	\$35
4	Cooking Class	Purchase materials for a Parent Circle Meeting training on preparing low cost, quick and nutricous family meals	\$50
5	Yoga Exercise Classes	Helping chiildren develop a life-long habit of exercise is important for their physical and mental well- being. Pay for a series of yoga classes for one classroom.	\$110

C. Housewares \Rightarrow Donated housewares.

1	Pots and Pans	Purchase a starter set of pots and pans for a family moving into an apartment from a battered women's shelter.	\$45
2	Dishes and Flatware	A set of dishes and flatware are seldom donated to ALIVE! but a family from a homeless shelter needs these items for their new apartment. Provide these essentials to a family.	\$75

D. Family Emergency Program ⇒ Assistance with rent, utilities, and medical expenses. Also donated canned and packaged food delivered by volunteers to approximately 100 families each month.

1	Eggs	Provide a dozen eggs each for ten families in need as a primary source of protein.	\$10
2	Medication	Provide the co-payment for a senior citizen otherwise unable to afford to fill prescriptions.	\$50
3	Utilities	Help a minimum-wage family pay for a portion of their winter heating bill.	\$75
4	Optical Exam	Pay for a low income senior to obtain an exam at a modest fee negotiated by Alexandria Social Services	\$79

E. Furniture \Rightarrow Donated beds, tables, chairs, chests, and other useable furniture, picked up and delivered by volunteers to ten to twelve families each weekend.

1	Beds	Help one child currently sleeping on the floor of an empty apartment by buying a single box spring and mattress.	\$100
2	Gas	Provide enough gas for one truck to pick up and deliver furniture to twelve families in need.	\$50

F. Last Saturday Food Distribution \Rightarrow A five day supply of food distributed by volunteers once a month to serve approximately 650 families each month.

1	Holiday Turkeys	Provide a 10 lb. turkey to a family for them to enjoy a traditional family meal during the holidays.	\$10
2	Meat and cheese	Help ALIVE! provide 200 lb. of much-needed meat and/or cheese to supplement canned food.	\$24
3	Peanut Butter and Jelly	Purchase a case of peanut butter and a case of jelly to make children from two dozen families very happy with an easy to prepare and nutricious lunch.	\$35
4	Collapsible Wagons	Purchase a wagon to help volunteers at the warehouse and families at a Last Saturday Food site.	\$48
