MARCH MADNESS

March is one of my favorite months because I thoroughly enjoy watching the NCAA basketball tournament. And it's not just because UNC has been quite successful in that tournament over the years. I enjoy it because of all the smaller school teams that get to play against teams from the major conferences and show that they can, on any given day, compete with teams with a lot more resources. It's the idea that the best team wins—not the team with the most McDonald's All-Americans or with the most impressive arena. It's the group of students who play together, who listen to their coach and who really love the game that does well in the tournament.

ALIVE! is a lot like a good basketball team. Everyone has a role and does their part to achieve the ultimate goal and make the group successful. An excellent example of that team approach is the staff of the Child Development Center. They achieved the equivalent of an NCAA championship recently with full accreditation of their program by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). We owe a debt of gratitude to CDC Director Pam Blankenship, the intrepid coach, who put together an excellent team and worked diligently on her game plan. When NAEYC deferred ALIVE!'s application last year, Pam was not discouraged but took the recommendations for improvement to heart. She worked to improve the caliber and professional development of the classroom teachers and aides and focused on each of the suggestions for improvement. That dedication and the new teachers she was able to attract to the CDC made a huge difference. And this year her team made it to the elite group of preschools that is fully accredited by NAEYC. This is a huge accomplishment and we can all be proud. Only 8% of preschools nationwide are NAEYC accredited.

The CDC is a wonderful program—providing a quality preschool education to at- risk children and nurturing the capability of these children and their families to achieve their full intellectual, economic and social potential. Study after study has shown that quality early education can make a huge difference. Especially for disadvantaged children, pre-kindergarten early learning programs reduce placement in special education, improve grade retention, reduce juvenile crime, increase high school graduation rates and dramatically improve earnings.

I hope you will stop by and visit the CDC and celebrate this NAEYC-accredited program where the children are enjoying themselves, learning skills and being nurtured to become all they can be. That's a March Madness we can all enjoy.

Alive! Child Development Center Earns National NAEYC Accreditation

The sounds of jubilation could be heard throughout the classrooms in the Child Development Center, down the hall in the Family Emergency Program and upstairs in the offices of Ken Naser and Kathy Richards. Child Development Center Director Pam Blankenship, the teachers, and even the children were celebrating the news that the CDC had been accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). The rigorous criteria are the "gold standard" in early childhood education.

The CDC is a key program in ALIVE.'s attempt to assist Alexandrians to acquire the skills they need to lead self-sufficient and productive lives. It builds on the fact that all children need high-quality, early childhood education to prepare them for school and working parents need low-cost, convenient and flexible care for their children. The CDC is open 51 weeks a year from 6:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. to allow parents to hold jobs and pursue their education with assurances that their children are well cared for, receiving nutritious food, and a great education.

The news from NAEYC could not have come at a better time. It has been a tough few years for the

working families of the CDC, including many one-parent households Reversals such as illness, job loss, increasing utility bills, and unexpected expenses have long been tipping points to destroy self-sufficiency, and the families of our preschoolers were hard hit by the recession.

Many parents lost jobs or had work hours reduced, but because stability is so important for these families, we allowed the children to remain despite the fact that our policies generally require the parents to be working or in school fulltime. Some parents lost better paying jobs and are struggling to get by on less pay and with no benefits. The CDC fees are based on a sliding scale, charging families only what they can afford to pay. Because of these setbacks for the parents and our fee policy, ALIVE! has been faced with more heavily subsidizing the CDC which means we must increase the level of contributions we need to reach each year.

Our achievement is particularly sweet since the CDC was, in1992, the first early childhood program to be accredited in Alexandria. Much has changed in early childhood education since our founding in 1972 by a group of mothers who lacked affordable care for their own children, and since our first accreditation nearly 20 years ago. The changes include the understanding of how children learn; what skills, learning and behaviors are needed for "school readiness"; and how children grow through "child-directed" developmentally appropriate learning opportunities. Operating costs have increased with greater understanding of how children learn. We focus on learning opportunities in language, selfexpression, independence, physical, cognitive and emotional development, socialization, creative expression, computer skills, and math and reading readiness. In order to provide these services to Alexandrians who need them most, the CDC depends on the financial support of those who recognize the importance and long-term benefit of a high-quality early childhood education. We have been blessed that a number of organizations have provided funding to the CDC. They include: Philip L. Graham Fund, ACT for Alexandria, The Virginia Early Childhood Foundation, Washington Forrest Foundation, Alexandria Rotary, Alexandria Day Nursery and Children's Home, Ivakota, Giving Circle of Alexandria, Weissberg Foundation, the City of Alexandria, the Gannett Foundation, and so many other generous individuals, businesses, and congregations.

NAEYC accreditation provides assurance to parents that their children are in good hands and to funders that their resources are being used wisely to achieve the desired result. The Alive! CDC Committee thanks the CDC Staff for this significant accomplishment and our supporters for making possible our efforts to prepare young children for a brighter future.

We will celebrate our accreditation and raise badly needed funds for the CDC at the walkathon scheduled for Sunday, May 1 at 2:00 pm. We will also remember and honor Ruby Tucker who worked at the CDC for over 20 years and served twelve of those years as the CDC's Director. Ruby was instrumental in securing our original NAEYC accreditation.

National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Accreditation

To earn NAEYC accreditation, the CDC was measured against ten early childhood Program Standards and over 400 related Accreditation Criteria. To be accredited, a program must meet all required criteria, meet at least 80% of assessed criteria for each program standard, meet at least 70% of assessed criteria for each classroom observed, and continue to meet the NAEYC requirements during the accreditation period of five years.

The Alive! CDC earned scores of 100% or more for six of the ten Program Standards – Relationships, Health, Teachers, Families, Community Relationships, and Leadership and Management. For the remaining standards, the scores were 95% for Teaching, 91% for Physical Environment, 90% for Assessment, and 82% for Curriculum. The percentage of criteria met for the two classrooms observed were 93% and 94%. Therefore, it is fair to say that the CDC passed "with flying colors."

New Designation - Same Great Place!

ALIVE! House will now be classified as a transitional housing program rather than as an emergency shelter. What will change? Only the designation for purposes of applying for grants from the Department of Housing and Community Development in Richmond (DHCD). Our Program Administrator at DHCD pointed out to us last fall that our residents stayed too long for us to call ourselves an emergency shelter. Since they average almost a year at ALIVE! House – six months longer than the limit at an emergency shelter, and some stay even longer -- it was time for us to become transitional housing. ALIVE! House is much more than a shelter from the weather and the storms of life, it is a program



wherein people put their lives together - overcoming many challenges as they gain the maturity to go forth on a new path of self-sufficiency and independence – a transformation that seldom happens in six months. So now, we will call ourselves what we are. Residents will be evaluated continuously and may, if approved, stay any length of time up to two years, and we will incur no penalty.

The ALIVE! House Advisory Committee, which is made up of three former Chairs: Catherine Thompson, Mary Riley, Kathleen Sullivan; current Chair, Susanne Arnold; House neighbor, Ann Matikan; former resident Reshma Begum; ALIVE! President Cheryl Malloy; and Ken Naser, both Staff and former Chair; has discussed this change in their last two meetings. As ALIVE! House goes through strategic planning and makes decisions about its future, you will see more details about the program in subsequent issues of the WIRE.

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Working together to help a neighbor

Late last month, Linda Coleman was working the desk at the Family Emergency Program (FEP) distributing funds for families in need when she returned a phone call to a woman seeking assistance with her rent. Nancy (not her real name) told Linda her story of being a Veteran and a breast cancer survivor who had fallen on hard times. She was receiving disability from the Veterans Administration, but she had lost her lease and was now living temporarily in a hotel, where the manager was allowing her to stay at a reduced daily rate. Unfortunately, Nancy's money had run out and she was facing having to survive on the street unless she could pay the \$200 she owed the hotel.

All of the FEP funds had been committed for the month, but Linda wanted to help this woman so she started making calls. A recommendation that she call Dave Taylor from First Agape Baptist Community (a member congregation of ALIVE!) yielded results. After many phone calls, including talking to Nancy several times, Dave was able to locate a parishioner who offered a bedroom in her own home to this woman in need. This kind parishioner even went to pick Nancy up from the hotel where she was stranded in the lobby and hoping for a miracle, having been informed by the manager just an hour earlier that she would have to leave.

The story has an even happier ending. Nancy found a room to rent in a private home in Fairfax County that she could afford on her VA disability income and moved to her new home after only a few days with her First Agape savior. She is extremely grateful to ALIVE! and First Agape for their assistance in her time of need. And it demonstrates, again, the commitment and caring of this community of faith that we call ALIVE!.
