Notes from the Executive Director - Diane Charles



Although I've only been at ALIVE! for three months, as a long-time Alexandrian, I've been keenly aware of ALIVE!'s valuable role in our community to help its most vulnerable neighbors. Now, being on this side of ALIVE!, I keep thinking of *sustainability*. *Sustainability* in terms of our programs' ability to understand current needs and evolve in ways that meet those needs; *sustainability* in terms of the people who carry out the programs, be they volunteers or paid staff – who are effectively recruited, equipped and trained – to ensure high quality program implementation today and in the future; *sustainability* in terms of the breadth and depth of our community's volunteers, ensuring we are attracting and engaging diverse, multi-generational volunteers who will see ALIVE! through the next generation; and of course, *sustainability* in terms of the financial means to ensure that emergency needs are met and innovative steps are taken to seek possible solutions. My sense is that we'll be better equipped to reach our goals if we are intune with and constantly addressing each of these *sustainability* perspectives.

For 46 years, ALIVE! has been the safety net for those who are struggling amongst us. Many of us in Alexandria know of ALIVE!'s good work. Yet, there are many who do not. It is incumbent upon ALIVE! to tell the story of those less fortunate so that others understand what poverty means in our own City. ALIVE!'s programs and services have to be known to be supported. I look forward to enhancing our efforts to highlight ALIVE!'s good work, as well as the needs for which ALIVE! exists to address.

In our 24-hours-a-day information world, ALIVE!'s communication (or lack thereof), can also impact our financial wellbeing. In the next several months, ALIVE!'s fundraising efforts will be critical to our financial health for this fiscal year. Communication and outreach for the following upcoming events will be vital to their success:

Ada had to start from the beginning - learning English, finding work with few job skills and learning how to be a single mom. Throughout her two years at ALIVE! House, she made incredible progress. She grew from a timid individual to a very strong woman.



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She attained her US citizenship, a steady job, and improved her English skills. The amount of emotional strength and confidence she gained was amazing. Ada left feeling a large amount

of gratitude for ALIVE! House, and those who believed in her. At her exit interview, she exclaimed that there was nothing she would have changed about her stay. She was just extremely thankful for the time and the chance. Ada continues to communicate with staff at ALIVE! House,, as well as staying in touch with the other moms, providing help and support.
